Learning Objectives

The student will be able to:

- Identify and perform correct fingering for all major scales
- Identify and perform correct fingering for all minor scales.
- Identify and perform correct fingering for scale modes.
- Demonstrate proper posture and technique at the piano.

<u>Unit II</u> [Triads, Seventh Chords and Inversions] [Supports Course SLOs #1,2,3]

Learning Objectives

The student will be able to:

- Produce correct performances of root position triads.
- Produce correct performances of root position seventh chords.
- Demonstrate an ability to perform triads and seventh chords in their inversions.
- Use techniques shown to perform advanced arpeggio exercises.

Learning Objectives

The student will be able to:

- Produce a deeper understanding of counterpoint exercises.
- Perform scales and exercises in both hands utilizing proper technique.
- Demonstrate their ability to perform two-handed pieces with varying degrees of independence in each hand.

Learning Objectives

The student will be able to:

- Show their ability to perform simple duets with other students.
- Use skills developed to perform in larger group settings.
- Organize a repertoire of Jazz pieces to showcase improvisation and rhythmic patterns.
