- Describe the Limited License Legal Technicians (LLLT) role and the emerging concepts for licensed paralegals within the scope of increasing access to justice.
- Apply NFPA Model Guidelines to hypothetical legal employment scenarios.
- Apply NALA Model Guidelines to hypothetical legal employment scenarios.
- Apply the ABA Model Guideline for the Utilization of Paralegals and ABA Model Rules of Professional Responsibility.

Unit II Ethical Practices for Law Practice Learning Objectives [Supports SLO 2, 3] The student will be able to...

• Describe the general principles of the practice of law and how UPL statutes regulate the practice of law.

- Analyze potential UPL violations and accurately determine whether the violation occurred.
- Distinguish actions constituting the practice of law from actions that a paralegal may independently manage.
- Apply best practices for paralegals to avoid UPL outside the legal employment setting.
- Explain best practices for paralegal utilization, per the ABA Guide to the Utilization of Paralegals.
- Formulate CIRAC/IRAC documents or similar legal analyses concerning UPL scenarios.

Unit III Ethics in Action Learning Objectives [Supports SLO 3, 4] The student will be able to...

- Communicate and apply the rules of confidentiality in law practice
- Recognize a conflict of interest and how it applies to paralegals and lawyers.
- Determine the correct course of action when a conflict of interest is recognized.
- Analyze legal advertisements and apply the jurisdiction's rules on advertising.
- Communicate the rule of legal fees and how this applies to lawyers and paralegals
- Communicate and apply the rules of legal case solicitation.
- Analyze and assess the rules of client funds, and determine how client funds can be handled.
- Apply the rules and appropriate solutions to special issues in advocacy.
- Maintain professional competence after graduation, and understand how the rules of professional competence and competent representation of clients apply to paralegals.
- Apply best practices of professionalism in the legal office, court, and with clients.

Unit IV Analysis and Application of Legal Concepts to Paralegal Work Learning Objectives [Supports SLO 5] The student will be able to...

- Research and analyze the hypothetical scenarios involving paralegals, lawyers, and judges in ethics and professionalism scenarios.
- Communicate and compare the various rules of law regarding legal ethics.
- Apply and select the correct rules or code to professional tasks, including confidentiality, rules affecting fees, solicitation and the practice of law.
- Demonstrate an understanding of current approached to paralegal licensure, exceptions at the federal and state level for specific roles including representation and related matters concerning UPL.

Quizzes: Essay, mechanics and grammar writing exercises and multiple-choice assessments designed to measure understanding of objective legal research and writing concepts.

Discussions: Course-related conversations in a live setting or via discussion board to support and assess concepts presented in the unit.
