A. General Objectives

1. To present several hundred new vocabulary words.
2. To reinforce the vocabulary presented in LT 101.
3. To introduce new basic grammar.
4. To reinforce and review grammar presented in LT 101.
5. To provide writing opportunities: words, sentences, paragraphs.
6. To provide reading opportunities.
7. To provide pronunciation opportunities.
8. To translate from Latin to English and vice versa.
9. To point out the debt of English and the Romance Language to Latin, particularly with respect to vocabulary.
10. To contrast the Latin with the English syntactical system.

B. Specific Objectives (Behavioral)

1. To write and recognize the following constructions:
 - a. Passive Voice
 - b. Gerunds and Gerundives
 - c. Subjunctive Mood
 - d. Imperative Mood
 - e. Comparisons
 - f. Relative Clauses
 - g. Conditional Sentences
 - h. Uses of the Infinitive
 - i. Participles
 - j. Indirect Questions
 - k. Indirect Discourse
2. To translate from Latin to English and vice versa.
3. To conjugate verbs of all four conjugations, and in every tense.
4. To decline nouns, pronouns and adjectives in all five cases, and in both singular and plural.

5. To answer factual questions based on Latin reading passages and to fill in blanks of sentences based on such passages.
 6. To read Latin passages aloud with reasonably accurate pronunciation.
- C. Testing and Measurement
1. Periodic collection and correction of written homework.
 2. Class participation and preparedness.
 3. Approximately six tests, each based on one or two text chapters.
 4. A final examination.
