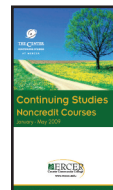

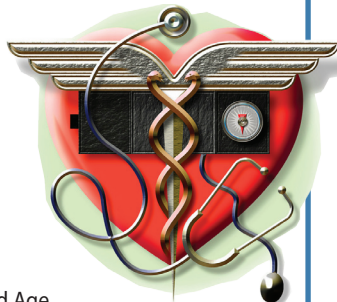

Introduction to Pharmacovigilance

After the withdrawal of several major products from the market because of safety concerns, the pharmaceutical industry and the regulatory agencies have increased their emphasis on patient safety and on the proper conduct of safety surveillance. This affects all levels of health care, ranging from the development of drugs, to proper prescribing and administration, to monitoring and surveillance of populations to assess adverse effects.

This course will provide an introduction and a solid foundation in the key components of clinical and postmarketing drug safety surveillance, also known as Pharmacovigilance. It will cover practical and theoretical aspects of the conduct of Pharmacovigilance, with emphasis on understanding of the concepts, on common themes underlying effective processes, and on the basic tenets of global regulatory compliance with safety principles.

Prerequisites: High school diploma or GED; a clear understanding of written and spoken English; background check; finger printing; proof of the following immunizations: Mantoux, HBV, MMR & Varicella; and 2-step PPD. Costs of the uniform, professional liability insurance, other material fees (approximately \$300) and the state exam fee are additional.

All applicants are required to attend a free Information Session at the Conference Center (XAH253-078961) on Wednesday, February 4 at 6pm. Please e-mail ComEd@mccc.edu or call (609) 570-3311 to reserve a seat one week prior to the Information Session.

Certified Nursing Assistants (CNAs) are greatly increasing in demand in response to the need for senior care in long-term care facilities, rehabilitation centers, and senior housing. This 90-hour course is approved by the NJ Department of Health and Senior Services. It is designed to meet the challenge by providing 50 hours of classroom and 40 hours of clinical instruction to prepare you for the New Jersey State Certified Nursing Assistant Certification Exam.

Regulatory and Legal Issues in Drug Development

Examine historical and legal cases as part of the evolution of new pharmaceutical compound development and investigate specific ethical principles and issues surrounding clinical research operations and the management of clinical trials. Included will be exercises for practical understanding of regulatory interactions concerning drug development, such as advisory committee meetings and regulatory inspections.

Pharmacy Technician Program

This program is dedicated to the student interested in becoming a Certified Pharmacy Technician, ultimately acquiring the skills to be able to sit for the National Exam. The student is offered seven classes in the field of pharmacy practice to help them master the skills of both retail and hospital settings.

Retail & Hospital Practices

This class, which shall be a split between both retail and hospital pharmacy technician responsibilities, will focus on two of the major aspects of the profession. The first half of the class will be directed towards a retail perspective, including prescription intake, renewals, and transfers as well as common retail prescription drugs. Inventory control, labeling and packaging of medications, along with compounding of creams and ointments shall also be discussed.

The second portion of the class will focus primarily on the student’s ability to comprehend the role of a pharmacy technician in a hospital facility. Various pharmacy equipment will be introduced as well as the creation of suspensions, elixirs, and IV medications. **Please bring the text used in Pharmacy Technician to class.**
